Our campaign kickoff on Sept. 21 was a resounding success – a true celebration of community.

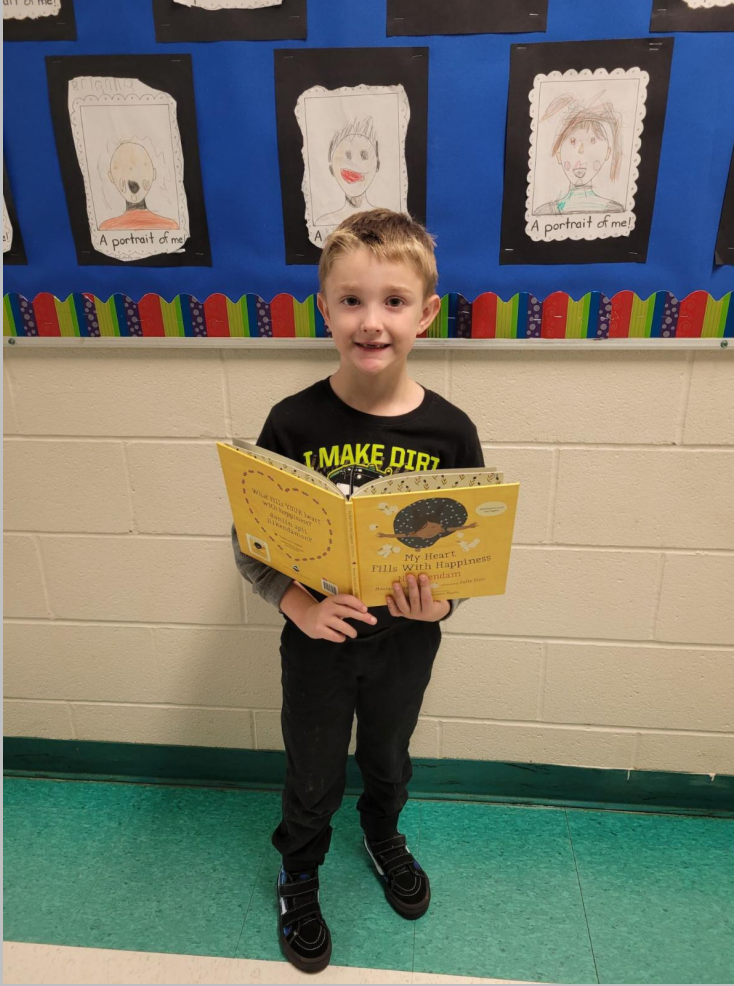


More than 500 people joined us at the Delta in Saint John to mark the official beginning of our fundraising efforts for the year – all in support of organizations to help those in our communities who need it most.

At Milltown Elementary School, students can enrol in a special camp at the school over the

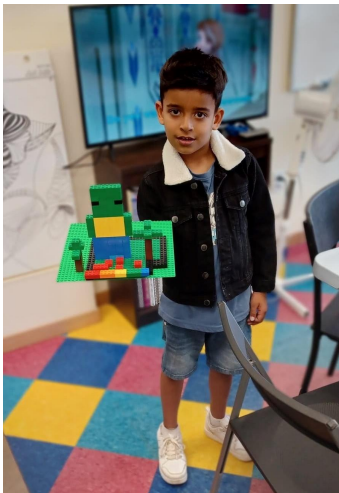


summer that focuses on helping them maintain literacy and numeracy over the two-month break.

Quarter Club: 'It's an honour to be a part of it'


For Greg Snow and the leadership at Fundy Fence, the Quarter Club proved to be an intriguing option to bolster the power of their corporate giving.
