

MILLION DOLLAR PLEDGE 5 YEAR IMPACT REPORT

The Million Dollar Pledge started in 2018 as a network of local businesses with each committed to donating \$10,000 a year for 10 years to fund socially-minded and impactful community projects. In the first five years, the focus has been on empowering elementary school children to enhance their academic achievements, equipping parents with valuable skills through specialized programs, and assisting high school students in at-risk environments to graduate successfully and pursue post-secondary education.


