Message From Our Chair

2015/2016 has been a wonderful year! We saw great growth in the seeds sewn in previous years with our new strategic directions and funding model and the maturation of Living SJ. Our partner organizations continue to strive for new and better ways to solve our community's most challenging issues, one life at a time. For example, last year 20 women left their abusive partner for a full year, AND 17 of these brave souls were either employed or registered for post-secondary education or training by the end of the year! Together, we are transforming lives!

We have strengthened relationships throughout our region, and, for the first time, offered substantial funding to Sussex area projects that contribute to local priorities. After funding the incredibly effective Milltown Elementary summer literacy and numeracy programs, we have expanded our support to include an additional 2 schools along with adding parenting and after-school programming. We are excited by the growth we anticipate in the upcoming year as we deepen these relationships, and as we welcome leaders Blair Hyslop and Derek O'Brien to our Board.

All of these important investments would not have been possible without such a successful campaign team. Joanne Nickerson and Chris Bourque co-chaired the campaign that raised over \$1.47 million, an 8% increase from the previous year! This growth would not have been possible without the great leadership of our many volunteers, a new partnership with Potash Corporation, the tremendous success of the IBEW Local 37/NB Power campaign, and the soft launch of our new Social Investment Advisory Service. Thank you again to our board who keeps challenging us to strive further, our volunteers who raise over a million dollars each year; our Community Investment Advisory Committee volunteers, chaired by Owen Green, who select the charities we will fund each year; the companies, unions, and professionals who generously partner with us; the charities who commit wholly to a better community, and the courage of our 'storytellers' who shared a glimpse into their struggles and triumphs so we could understand and remember why we are here!

Lastly, we would like to welcome our new volunteer leaders: Victoria Clarke is the 2016 Campaign Chair, Linda MacDonald is the Community Investment Advisory Chair, and Christine Hanlon is our new Board Chair. We are in good hands!

Nancy's life has had many obstacles, but if there's one thing you should know about her, it's that she's not a quitter. Due to an undiagnosed learning disability, she struggled in school and ended up leaving high school before graduating. As a mother of two, Nancy wanted to set a good example for her children and make them proud. She decided she wanted to go back to school.

"I was pretty nervous to start at The Learning Exchange because I was embarrassed about my abilities... what I learned very quickly from The Learning Exchange is that it is a place of non-judgement and support."

Nancy's journey to get her GED was not an easy one – but she never gave up, and with the help of her teachers at The Learning Exchange, she came to love learning. Nancy finally received her GED and set new goals to find a career she loves. Nancy is no longer on social assistance, she works full-time, and is proud to be showing her children the right road to take.



Social Investment Advisory Service

In 2014, the United Way Saint John Kings & Charlotte started working on a new concept—the Social Investment Advisory Service. After completing our funding redesign we wanted to optimize our new rigorous allocations process and open it up to individuals, foundations and companies looking to make significant donations in their community. The program was officially launched in 2015 with great results, and already in the first three months of our 2016 campaign we are exceeding expectations.

The United Way advisor meets with interested parties to discuss their passions and giving interests. The advisor then recommends social investment options from a portfolio of high potential opportunities based on their interests. The United Way offers due diligence by managing contracting, reporting, and communications with the charity.





Five-Year Campaign Growth




Five Year Trends

Funds by Source



Success Story



Trish is a survivor of emotional, physical, mental, and verbal abuse. She spent her life coping with tragedy and negative influences, carrying a feeling of betrayal with her for over 25 years. By her 29th birthday, she was the mother of five children. She is a recovering alcoholic and addict.

Trish was in the Power Up! Program from March to June of 2014. Her goal was to go back to school, but that quickly changed when she gained custody of her two grandchildren. Becoming a full-time grandmother was a challenge, but something she "wouldn't change for the world."

"I do believe attending Power Up! was the beginning of additional positive changes in my life. In Power Up! I started to see how working with other women brought about a strength in me that needed to be nurtured and loved. Nurtured and loved by me!" Because of the Power Up! Program, Trish has learned that she is not a product of her failures and mistakes. She now has full-time employment with the Women's Empowerment Network and is enjoying life as a mother and grandmother.
